


- School Day: 8.50am and finishes at 3.15pm.

Maths in Year One

- Maths is taught through carpet sessions, group activities and independent classroom tasks
- Problem solving questioning that link to everyday scenarios
- Still working in practical and hands on approach but a big step up from Foundation Stage Curriculum

Supporting Reading in Year 1

1-1 reading / Guided Reading

- Home support crucial for developing fluency and sight vocabulary regular short bursts.
- Reading with an adult in school at least once a week could be the class teacher, teaching assistant or other adults to support reading in school.
- Reading engagement Oxford Owl: https://www.oxfordowl.co.uk/api/courses/27/digital_books/1357.html
- A variety of non-fiction/fiction books.
- Children encouraged to listen to others and contribute to group discussion on text.
- Higher focus on comprehension and understanding of text.

Top 10 tips to help children enjoy reading

- Make books part of your family life Always have books around so that you and your children are ready to read whenever there's a chance.
- Join your local library Get your child a library card. You'll find the latest
 videogames, blu-rays and DVDs, plus tons and tons of fantastic books. Allow them
 to pick their own books, encouraging their own interests.
- Match their interests Help them find the right book it doesn't matter if it's fiction, poetry, comic books or non-fiction.
- All reading is good Don't discount non-fiction, comics, graphic novels, magazines and leaflets. Reading is reading and it is all good.
- Get comfortable! Snuggle up somewhere warm and cosy with your child, either in bed, on a beanbag or on the sofa, or make sure they have somewhere comfy when reading alone.
- 6. Ask questions To keep them interested in the story, ask your child questions as you read such as, 'What do you think will happen next?' or 'Where did we get to last night? Can you remember what had happened already?'
- Read whenever you get the chance Bring along a book or magazine for any time your child has to wait, such as at a doctor's surgery.
- Read again and again Encourage your child to re-read favourite books and poems.
 Re-reading helps to build up fluency and confidence.
- Bedtime stories Regularly read with your child or children at bedtime. It's a great
 way to end the day and to spend valuable time with your child.
- Rhyme and repetition Books and poems which include rhyme and repetition are great for encouraging your child or children to join in and remember the words.

- New sound mats


End of year expectations — children should be able to read common exception words with *all* the 40+ phonemes taught.

Year 1 Phonics Screening Test – real and made up words.


Writing in Year 1



Pupil Premium

What is Pupil Premium?

Pupil Premium was introduced to help schools to further support the children of low income families. Children attract additional funding to the School. We can use the money to fund (for example):

- Additional tuition
- Pay for day and residential trips
- Pay for an after school club
- Fund uniform

Eligibility (these can be found on the school website, click here)

We encourage eligible parents to apply for Pupil Premium support. There is no stigma attached to applying for this funding and families will not be aware that you have done so. A child may be eligible for free school meals (FSM) and therefore pupil premium, if their parents receive any of the following benefits:

- Income Support
- · Income-based Jobseekers Allowance (JSA)
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided the parents are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190
- Working Tax Credit run-on, which is paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax credit
- Universal Credit for those applying on or after 1 April 2018, their household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits they get). See the section below for protections in place for those affected by the introduction of this income threshold

A child can also claim pupil premium if:

- They are a looked after or previously looked after child
- They have one or both parents in the armed services (service pupil premium)
